GUIDE TO THE WEEKLY PARSHA

Kohen - First Aliya: Chapter 10, verses 1 - 11

- Moshe and Aron warns Pharaoh that a plague of locusts are on their way if Hashem's people are not set free.
- Pharaoh's advisers implores with Pharaoh to say yes. Pharaoh tells Moshe, that he will release all the men only so they can honour their God.
- Moshe disagrees with the terms and insists that everyone including all their cattle and sheep must be set free too. Pharaoh refuses and throws both Moshe and Aron out of his palace.

Levi - Second Aliya: Chapter 10, verses 12 -23

- Moshe stretches out his staff and an east wind blows over the whole of the land of Mitzraim (Egypt); bringing with it swarms of locusts destroying everything in its path.
- Pharaoh admits that he has sinned against Hashem and begs Moshe and Aron to pray on his behalf to end the plague. Once Hashem sent down a west wind to remove the locusts, Pharaoh once more went back to his original stance and refused to let the people to go.
- Moshe stretched out his hands this time towards heaven and darkness enveloped the land for three days, however wherever the Jewish people lived or went they had plenty of light to see.

Sh'lishi - Third Aliya: Chapter 10, verse 24 - Chapter 11, verse 4

- Pharaoh tells Moshe to take everyone and leave, Moshe demanded not without their cattle and sheep as they are needed for korbonos (sacrifices).
- ♣ Enraged Pharaoh refuses and decrees that the next time Moshe sees him, he will be killed.
- Moshe is informed by Hashem that one final plague is on its way but first Bnai Yisrael must go to their Egyptian neighbours demanding for all the gold and silver vessels in their possession, so they will depart as a wealthy nation.

R'VI'I - Fourth Aliya: Chapter 11, verse 5 - Chapter 12, verse 20

- Moshe warns Pharaoh that Hashem, at approximately midnight, will smite down every first born, man and beast leaving the whole of Mitzraim crying out in grief.
- Hashem informs Moshe that the month of Nissan will from this day forward be the first month of the Jewishcalendar year.
- Hashem then commanded that Bnai Yisrael to each sacrifice a lamb on the fourteenth day and consume it along with matzah and bitter herbs that night. The blood from the lambs must then be painted on their doorposts so Hashem will pass over them at midnight sparing their firstborns from death.

Chamishi - Fifth Aliya: Chapter 12, verses 21 - 28

Moshe relayed Hashem's instructions to the elders of Israel, emphasizing that in the future when their children and descendants will ask what is the meaning of all this. You can answer This is the Pesach sacrifice when Hashem passed over your houses, saving them from having to mourn for their beloved firstborn

Shishi - Sixth Aliya: Chapter 12, verses 29 - 51

- The death of the firstborn takes place. Pharaoh seeks out Moshe, ordering him that everyone must leave now, immediately
- The exodus begins with over 600,000 men and their families along with their livestock, departing Mitzraim for good.

Sh'vi'i - Seventh Aliya: Chapter13, verses1 - 16

- Hashem tells Moshe that this festival of Pesach is to be commemorated every year in the spring time in honour of remembering this exodus; and issues the laws relating to the Korban Pesach. Furthermore upon arrival into the land of Israel, all firstborn males of all kinds of animal must be given to Hashem but any firstborn boy will be redeemed by giving money to the Kohen.
- Finally the words of the torah dealing with the exodus are to be enclosed into Tefillin (along with the first two chapters of the shema) and are to be worn to serve as a constant sign and reminder of what has taken place.

Haftorah-YERMEYAH(JEREMIAH) Chapter 46 verses 13 to 28

OVERVIEW:

- This week's Haftorah continues with the same subject of last week's relating to Yechezkel's (Ezekiel)prediction of Nebuchadnezzar defeating the might of the Egyptians.
- Hashem tells Yermeyah (Jeremiah) to convey the message to the king of Bavel, (Babylon) that the time has come to attack Mitzraim and that Hashem himself will see to it that the Egyptians will be defeated and be totally at their mercy.
- Yermeyah reassures the Jewish people that Hashem has once moresecured their survival and will one day soon end their golus (exile) so they can reclaim the land of Israel for themselves.

SNAPSHOT GUIDE THROUGH THE SIDDER: Pesukei D'Zimrah - Ashrei (part 2)

- The first line of Tehilim 145, 'I will exalt you, my god my king....) is the main focal point of what the Ashrei Prayer is about. Recognising and acknowledging that Hashem is the one supreme source above the laws of nature and is running the world and that we have faith that everything he does is for our spiritual benefit and development.
- The Second line praising Hashem's name forever and ever delineates that we appreciate all the new blessings both in physical capacities as well as spiritual, Hashem has bestowed upon us every single day.

WEEKLY DISCUSSION:

In order to commemorate Hashem's commandment to remember when He passed over our ancestor's houses, saving them from the wrath of the final plague to strike Mitzraim 'The killing of the firstborn', we have the mitzvor of the Korban Pesach (The Paschal Sacrifice). This would be offered up in the Beis Hamikdosh on the afternoon of 14th of Nissan and consumed after nightfall on the first night of Pesach. Today, we honour the korban Pesach by eating the Afikomen after our meal on Seder night.

The Korban Pesach itself marks the transformation from Golus, "exile" to Geulah, "redemption". But what does it actually symbolise at that precise junction in our Jewish history?

Golus is where the Jewish people are physically dispersed in all four directions around the world outside our true homeland (The Land of Israel) and spiritually being reflectively distant from our one and true master; Hashem. Redemption on the other hand is the physical ingathering of the dispersed from all the four" corners of the globe, unifying us as one unit to return back and serve Hashem. Literally, coming home and becoming one with Hashem.

The first everkorban Pesach revolved around the Jewish home. The blood was placed on the doorpost, the meat was eaten inside the house, and nobody could leave the house till morning. During temple times, the offering of the korban Pesach was consumed by family units and neighbours. Even now the preparation for Pesach focuses on removing chametz from one's home.

The significance of our Jewish home connects the beginning and the end of the book of Shemot. The Jewish People are described as the "Beis Yaakov - the house of Yaakov" in the opening pasukand concludes with "Beis Yisrael - the house of Israel" at the end of the book, seeing Hashem's Glory resting on the Mishkan. The goal of the book ofShemot is to transform our Jewish homes into places worthy of the Divine Presence to dwell. Hashem's presence was not relegated just to the Mishkan, rather the Mishkan served as a model for sanctify withinall our homes. The celebration of Pesach involves not only visiting the Beis Hamikdash but also the preparation of our homes as smaller Mishkan's. During the week of Pesach our homes are elevated to the status of a Mikdashwhich is why allchametz must be removed. Similarly, the first korban Pesach didn't require an actual Mizbayah (altar) either since the doorpost to every home served that purpose.

The objective of the korban pesach is to ensure our spirituality is the driving force behind our physical actions. Last week we memorialised all the precious Jewish blood that was spilt during the terrible atrocities of the Holocaust. Just as the redemption in the aftermath of the original Korban Pesach, where the Jewish people left Mitzraim as one unified nation, so too the future and final redemption from the "four Goluses" (Babylon, Persia & Media, Greece and Rome), will unanimously proclaim and accept Hashem's Oneness and all those who perished in the holocaust would not have died in vain. As a reminder to us all, the message of the korban Pesach is that we must try and find Hashem everywhere and at all times in our lives. If we can achieve this then we too will be able to transform the "Beis Yaakov" into "Beis Yisrael" in which we can and always see the Divine Presence resting and residing amongst us.
